Focus - Finding and Dealing with Distractions

Zoe McGrath, Zoe McGrath Photography, Thursday 6 July, Kenmore Library

Our first event for the new financial year was a game-changer for many members looking to elevate their competition images.

QCG member Zoe McGrath, from Zoe McGrath Photography, shared with us her tips and tricks for creating professional quality images by finding and dealing with distractions.

This is one of the key areas that judges look at closely and often one of the biggest learning curves for members.

Zoe's presentation was terrific. She ran through a list of top distractions and then gave us some tools to remove them.

Top distractions included:

- Areas of high saturation;
- Anything leading your eye out of an image;
- Light spots, that is, areas within an image that attract the eye because they are lighter than the balance of the image's content;
- Disharmony of colour (Zoe showed us an example where greens in the bottom of an image did not match greens in the top half of the image).

In another example, in one of Zoe's dog portraits, she removed the hint of horizon entirely from the image as it was deemed distracting (see below)!

Zoe's before and after photos were a great way to illustrate her points, and we were also given the opportunity to download the wallaby image so that we could follow along on the our laptops.

Speaker - The Art of Bird Photography

Jane McMenamin, Thursday 13 July, F2F and Zoom

The club is indeed fortunate to feature members who so freely give of their time and happily share their expertise, and Jane McMenamin's July speaker presentation was a wonderful example of this.

QCG president Martin Riley introduced Jane as being one of the pre-eminent bird photographers locally, whose images could sit happily on an international stage. No one disagreed.

In Jane's words, her presentation was all about the art of bird photography, specifically, what makes a 'zinger' of a bird photo!

In short, Jane says you can elevate your bird shots by understanding the locations of the birds you are photographing, seeking out beautiful light, going out in all weather and closely observing bird behaviour.

In terms of what makes a zinger, Jane says light, composition, capturing the defining moment, emotional impact, technical skills and editing – the same as regular photography (except that Jane makes it look so easy!).

In terms of light it was great to be reminded of, and have catalogued, the myriad lighting options available to us including front light, back light, soft light, dappled light, ring light and silhouette.

Now retired from paid work, we all hope Jane will find even more time to create beautiful bird imagery. As Tony FitzGerald said when Jane announced her retirement, "Look out birds!".

APS Honours Special Interest Group -

My Process For Curating And Managing My Images For Honours Success

Paul Balfe FAPS, Tuesday 18 July,

The APS Honours Special Interest Group was fortunate to have Redlands Camera Club member Paul Balfe talk to the group about his journey to receiving APS Honours and some key tips and tricks to make the journey successful and importantly enjoyable.

Paul had certainly been on a marathon in his pursuit of Honours entering 73 different Salons/Competitions around the world in ten different countries, mostly over the past 2-3 years. This represented over 1200 entires. From this Paul achieved 318 Acceptances and 45 different awards from 19 different images. Yes, Paul has kept very detailed records and statistics!!

So what are Paul's key tips in preparing for international competition:

- 1. Persistence believe in your images. Different judges see things differently!
- 2. Target Setting pick your fights! Be strategic and determine whether you need more acceptances (with successful images) or new awards (with new images).
- 3. Preparation which competitions play to your strength
- 4. Systematic and good record keeping!

And finally, how to pick the best image for competition. (Don't we all need these tips!). Paul check list in order is:

- 1. Wow Factor
- 2. Technical Excellence
- 3. Subject Definition nailed
- 4. Composition and design
- 5. Aesthetics

Paul certainly inspired many of the attendees with his photography and amazing organisational skills in preparing for competition.

2023 APS Australian Cup Competition Judging


Friday 28 July, hosted by the Australian Photographic Society via Zoom

Bumping In (and a History of the Bump Ins that Went Before)

By David Bullock, Tuesday 17 June, Maud Street Gallery

In 2016, 14 makers exhibited up to ten prints at Gallery 61, Queensland Academy of Creative Industries (QACI) Kelvin Grove. The matted prints were hung using magnets on the 4 corners of the print.

In 2018, 19 makers exhibited six prints each at the Percolator Gallery in Paddington. Phil Lawrence devised an ingenious system for hanging unframed matted prints to allow facilitating the use of the gallery's system (see Phil, top right, at Percolator Gallery).

Unfortunately, the planned 2020 exhibition of up to 4 images was postponed due to COVID-19.

A format change for the Collections 2021 Exhibition at the Aspire Gallery, Paddington, where images were selected from a set subject competition, Street Photography, judged by John Lomas. All Honour images and some merits—a total of 40 images from 30 participants—were included in the exhibition and once again the prints were hung using the Phil Lawrence hanging system.

2023 Naturally - A Photographer's Perspective on our Natural World at The Maud Street Photo Gallery, Newstead. This year the 38 image makers exhibiting had a set wall space allocated, allowing them to choose whether to exhibit one large image or a themed portfolio. All the images were professionally framed and hung using the gallery's hanging system. Curation was fine-tuned and finalized on Tuesday 27th by Mel Sinclair, Martin Riley, Anne Pappalardo, Jane McMenamin, Tony FitzGerald, Georgie Crossley and Eric Victor (Queensland Centre for Photography). With many hands making light work, the rest of the day was spent hanging the photographs by the above with help from John Edwards, David Bullock, Heleen Daniels and her very tall son Titan; using laser beam 'state-of-the-art' technology for precision levelling.

The hanging of QCG members' wonderful images at our very special exhibitions is always a fun day and a great preview opportunity.

The Graham Burstow Monochrome Prize has been established to honour of Graham Burstow OAM SAPS PSQA FFRPS FAPS EFIAP.

Graham was one of the founding members of the Australian Photographic Society, and since that time he contributed enormously to the Society and it's members.

He was involved in the establishment of the APS national and international exhibitions. Graham was the APS President from 1982 to 1984, and he was the Print Division Chairman for ten years.

Graham passed away at the age of 92 years in 2022

He was a legend in the photography world, having been recognised by an Order of Australia Medal in 2004 for his services to photography. The first Queenslander to do so, he achieved a Fellowship in each of the Australian, British, and American Photographic Societies.

Graham's stunning photographs are held in many institutions around Australia, including the National Library in Canberra, and HOTA on the Gold Coast. His images show his great passion for street photography, especially in Mono.
