And for those of us who entered the annual Salon of Excellence competition sponsored by PSQ, you may also have had an additional 48 images to prepare!

While I know competition isn't for everyone at the club, for those hesitating to join in, I just wanted to briefly share my experience in my five or so years at QCG. As a very average B Grade entrant when I joined, it was the monthly challenge of preparing images for comp, receiving feedback (albeit occasionally bruising) and seeing the work of the many inspirational photographers in our club that has improved my photography out of sight. So from being a hesitant entrant a few years ago, now I look forward every month to our competition nights.

Speaking of, I also want to recognise the huge effort from the team who brings these competitions to our members every month. Of course, Elizabeth Riley is at the hub of everything competition with a huge effort in organising competitions, managing MyPhotoClub, preparing presentations and on and on. However, there is also the big

job of organising our volunteer judges which is undertaken by Jasmine Westerman, and the handling, delivering, and managing of all our prints by Georgie Crossley. Then there is the support crew of David Bullock (Competition backup and projector) and Rob Champion and Geoff Shortland (Zoom and sound).



This month for the first time QCG was able to deliver an impact judging of the Tri Nations competition to members' homes via Zoom, and then facilitated zooming into SPACE, live from Yorkshire, our highly acclaimed animal photographer judge Jessica McGovern - and wasn't she fantastic! All this while launching a brand-new sound system. Well done team! Then one week later they backed it up with a print only judging at SPACE!

For those wanting to expand their competition horizon beyond QCG and go international, our Special Interest Group on APS Honours will restart in April. For those interested <u>read further</u> in Prism or come along to our meeting on April 18 at Kenmore Library.

The great news is that Mel has now joined our club, and we look forward to seeing more of her great images and learning from her photography experiences. 

### **Competitions Update**

March was a busy competition month. The March 23rd judging night began with the live impact judging of the Tri Nations competition, an annual competition between Stoke Poges Photographic Club in England and Westville Camera Club in South Africa. Elizabeth Kodela (right, arm raised) and Daryl Fisher did the honours, and thanks to Yvonne Hill (in signature purple) for stepping in at short notice to replace the third judge. For the first time the club live streamed an impact judging via Zoom, with the webcam pointed at the score monitor allowing members viewing from home to see both the image and the score.

In another first, our judge for Animals and Open (DPI) zoomed into SPACE from England. Jessica McGovern (see middle), an awardwinning pet photographer, photographic trainer and judge, provided us with so many reminders about the importance of the tiny details when finishing off an image. Her commentary recognised the positive points in each image while providing us with very clear indications of how to improve it in post-processing. Recurring points included photographing animals from low angles and giving them space to look into. We will all be very mindful of blown highlights after







this judging night, a frequent downfall of otherwise excellent images.

The Print judging of Nature and Open was held on March 30<sup>th</sup>, F2F at SPACE. Margaret O'Grady (above), past president of the Australian Photographic Society and well regarded PSQ judge, reminded us of the additional constraints that apply to the Nature definition (which can be summed up as minimal evidence of 'the hand of man', and limited post processing options allowed). Viewing prints on the light box (thanks to the team of David, Georgie and John) while hearing the critique is a particular pleasure on our print judging nights.

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



### **Tri Nations Competition**

QCG has participated in the Tri Nations competition since 2013 (click <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a> to read David Bullock's history of this competition). Each club (QCG from Australia, Stoke Poges Photographic Club in England and Westville Camera Club in South Africa) submits 20 images. All 60 images are then judged anonymously in each country.

The QCG Grading Panel members chose the club's entries from Honours and Merit images from the last 12 months, not an easy task with so many admirable images, and 20 members were represented this year.

For the Queensland round, images were scored via impact judging (with Elizabeth Kodela, Daryl Fisher on judge duty, and Yvonne Hill filling in at late notice).

In both the Queensland and England rounds, QCG placed first, Westville Second and Stoke Poges third. In the South African round, Westville placed first, QCG second and Stoke Poges third. Tallying all the scores, QCG ended up in first place, for only the second time in recent memory – usually Westville wins the honours.



Each club also nominates their top 3 images. Congratulations to Michele McDougall for *Beauty will blossom* (1st in the QCG round, see right) and Jane McMenamin for *Making Has*te (2nd in the Stoke Poges Round, see bottom right). Other QCG images which scored well in different rounds included My Father My Hero (Georgie Crossley), Horseshoe Falls (Judy Greer) and An Ocean In Her Hair (Hamid Rahnama) in the Westville round; Canyon sand fall (Cheryl Mares), Coming in hot (Anne Pappalardo) and Roulette Rooster Tails (Peter Moodie) in the QCG round, and Sugar milling (Ray Shorter) and My what big eyes you have (Harvey Kramer) in the Stoke Poges round.

### Special Interest Group—APS Honours

The APS Honours Special Interest group was established last year to support members who were interested in challenging their photography in competition outside of QCG and aiming to achieve recognition via the Honours system through the Australian Photographic Society (APS).

As a result of supporting and promoting this system within the club, several members have achieved this recognition in the last year or so with Anne Pappalardo, Elizabeth Riley, Georgie Crossley and Joy Melchiori all receiving Associateship level (AAPS) and Martin Riley and Sue Chen achieving Fellowship (FAPS) level. It is my desire to continue to support members in this endeavour by maintaining this Special Interest Group in some form.

#### So, what are APS Honours?

As part of its services to members, the Australian Photographic Society has an Honours system. Through this system members can gain acceptances and awards in National and International exhibitions and ultimately receive Honours or recognition at different levels. Alternatively, they can submit a set of images to APS for panel judging to achieve the same outcome. They can then use the relevant letters after their names.

#### Why do it?

It gives you the incentive to improve your photography, the satisfaction of having your images recognised in a wider arena, an appreciation of wonderful images from other photographers around the world, ideas for your own photography, the gratification of receiving acceptances or awards and, in the exhibition system, an occasional image in a catalogue. Have a go.

#### So what Is the aim of this special interest group?

- Provide education about the APS Honours system and the options available for members. This could extend to other award systems such as FIAP.
- Provide mentoring for people who are going through the APS Honours process, including image selection.
- Provide insight into upcoming international competitions and help members prepare.
- Share images and results from members currently entering competitions to give others an indication of what types of images are doing well.
- Image critique sessions for photographers to assist in selection for Honours or international competitions.

By road it is about 20 mins to Teewantin and 25mins to Noosaville. Nearby hinterland towns of Pomona, Cooran, Cooroy and Kin Kin are all within a half hour drive of the Village.

Lake Cootharaba dominates the focus of the village and most of the residents use the lake for sport, recreation and just chilling out by the shore. Sailing, kayaking, kite boarding and all manner of other watercraft are popular on the lake. The western shore is lined with melaleuca trees while the eastern shore is forested with mangroves. There is plenty to offer our bird and wildlife photographers with an abundance of wildlife in the area.

The next point to the north on the Lake is Elanda Point and is the location of Noosa Habitat camping ground. From here there are a number of walks, short to Mill Point and longer to Kinaba at the head of the lake and start of the renowned Noosa River Everglades and Cooloola National Park.
