

With our end of year *Nature Image of the Year* competition happening next month, we are proud to present some of QCG's best nature photographers in Jane McMenamin and Paul Harrop at this month's Focus Group session. Jane and Paul have been wowing us over recent year's with their amazing collection of birds and insects respectively.

The theme of Jane's presentation is 'Uncommonly Common - the Challenges and Rewards of Photographing Common Birds'. Jane would like to show how you don't need to travel to far-flung places to capture interesting photos of birds because there is a rich resource of potential images to be found in your local park, bushland, river, lake or wetlands. She aims to demonstrate several techniques to enable the photographer to capture images of common birds from an uncommon perspective. Jane will cover location, light, techniques, settings, editing and basic equipment.

Paul's macro presentation will be about his journey from where he began to where he is now. Along the way he'll discuss the changes to his techniques, methods and equipment that he has and now uses. He'll conclude with a slideshow of some of his favourite macro shots.

Queensland Interclub Competition 2021

On a lovely Spring Saturday Martin and Elizabeth Riley headed up the range to Toowoomba City Library for the judging of the Queensland Interclub Competition.

This competition is open to all PSQ affiliated clubs. There are seven categories and clubs may enter three images in each category. To encourage a wide participation within clubs, larger clubs are allowed a maximum of two images per member. This year QCG managed to spread the love further than that, including entries from 18 different club members.

There are three subjects that are used each year in one variation or another (Scapes, Portrait/People and Nature), and then three new set subjects are suggested by the clubs and voted on at the delegates' meeting. The seventh subject is an Open topic for Non-A graders. The set subjects for the Interclub are the starting point for the set subjects in our club competitions each year, so that QCG has a pool of relevant images to draw the club entry from.

Clubs take turns hosting this event and Toowoomba Photographic Society did a wonderful job of running the competition this year. In recent times this has been a digital image competition only, but this year prints were allowed, which two clubs took advantage of.

Toowoomba used new impact judging software which allowed judges to view one screen while the audience could see the images and the image score on another screen. While there were a few hiccups in the initial rounds, the judging proceeded efficiently thereafter.

Congratulations to Aspley Camera Club who won the competition, closely followed by Mt Gravatt Photographic Society, with QCG finishing a creditable third out of the 21 clubs participating. Although primarily a club event, individual awards of First, Second, Third, Highly Commended and Merit are given in each category. Congratulations to Cheryl Mares for her First in Still Life for 'A filament in time', Martin Riley for his first in People for 'Made in Italy' and Anne Pappalardo for her Highly Commended in Still Life for 'Killer Heels'. At the delegates meeting set subjects for next year were chosen - to be revealed to QCG club members at the end of year function. Congratulations to Brisbane Camera Group for taking on the running of the competition in 2022. Delegates were happy that QCG has agreed to run the River City Prints competition in 2022 which will reinvigorate prints, which means that the Interclub can revert to the purely digital competition it has been in recent years.

This was a valuable opportunity to network with members of other clubs, to see impact judging in action and to enjoy a range of images from around the state. And a bonus was a brief stroll through Queens Park afterwards to enjoy the Carnival of Flowers! 

Looking Forward To 2022 - Your Help Required!

It has been an enormous effort in a challenging time. By comparison with similar camera clubs in Brisbane, we have relatively few people in key roles. The Committee are keen to see as many people as possible throw up a hand to lighten the load and keep our beaut club ticking along. To assist you, we have put together a list of possible roles that you might like to consider. Please peruse the list below to see if anything appeals!

- Equipment Officers (Computer, Sound, Setup and Operation of Projector on club nights) and backup to this role—training provided in this, the engine room of the club.
- Catering Coordinators (could be a shared role) just add milk!; set up and clean up supper; and buy supplies every now and again.
- Back up Zoom Coordinators and IT Support
 (relieving Rob Champion from time to time) training also provided for this task.
- Secretary Support (including Mailchimp, calendar updates, Floktu) - very basic computer confidence needed.
- Back up Webmaster—assistance to Gaye Edwards.
- Assistant Competitions Officer support for Elizabeth Riley.
- Biennial Collections Exhibition Coordinator/s organising this wonderful exhibition every two years
- River City Prints Competition Coordinator—QCG will be the coordinator of this interclub event this year so this is a once-off.
- Welcoming Officers—seek out and welcome new members and guests at face to face events and provide introductions.
- Annual Dinner Coordinator—coordinate this annual dinner including venue liaison and seating plan (the awards are handled separately).
- Fundraising Officer—secure prizes and seek funding as needed by the club.
- Social Media Coordinator posting to the club's business Facebook page and Instagram page share stories and QCG images on social media platforms to give club a digital presence.

QCG Member's Work Shortlisted in Brisbane Portrait Prize

QCG has always had a strong interest in portrait photography, led ably by Gaye Edwards and encouraged by experienced members including Phil Lawrence, whose image of Normie Rowe has been shortlisted in this year's Brisbane Portrait Prize. This is the second time Phil has been shortlisted for this prize and we asked him for a few words on his wonderful achievement.

"Spurred on by reaching the finals in the 2020 Digital Section of the Brisbane Portrait Prize, I again entered this year with a portrait of Normie Rowe AM. The more mature reader will remember Normie as the pop star of the 60 's, who in 1968 was drafted into the Army and served in the Vietnam War. On return home, he found that his pop career was virtually over. However, he launched another career as actor and musical theatre performer. He still performs enthusiastically to this day.

I had never met Normie, but with a shared military background, I contacted him in February this year with a view to making his portrait for the 2021 Brisbane Portrait Prize. He has numerous connections with Brisbane. So after a meeting with him and attending his concert in Nambour, we finally got together in my makeshift studio in June. Normie was a delight to photograph. He offered advice on life, told jokes, stories and even sang a song during the single studio shoot.

As you would imagine, I took many photos of him with my trusty Canon 5D Mk 2 and Elinchrome Studio lights. It was a great experience getting to find out more about him, helping him relax and taking photos as we went. Several poses were tried, each revealing something else about him and allowing me to get to know him better. He really was inseparable from his guitar, and so the portrait I eventually chose was him at the moment of mid riff with a determined look on his face. This said it all to me.

The features that stand out to me are: his face, his raised right hand and the left hand on the guitar strings. A dark background and his dark plain jumper isolates these



features. I call it "Still in the Game" as it helps reveals his attitude to ongoing performances at the age of 74.

The photo has been printed on enhanced matte paper and framed in a 34" x 24" wooden frame with non-reflective glass. Progressing from a DPI to this wonderful framed print (in my mind!) was quite an experience and worth every minute and dollar.

It was selected as a finalist and is currently on Exhibition in the Powerhouse with many other fabulous photographic and other media portraits until the end of October. Please go along and have a look at them all. "

A sausage sizzle BBQ dinner will give us all the opportunity to reflect on what will be some of the best images this club can produce.

During each session (prints first followed by DPIs in the evening) MC Martin Riley will talk us through the judging of each category and facilitate judge feedback during and after this impact-style judging.

Not only will members have the opportunity to see how well their images fared compared to their peers, this is also an opportunity for your family and friends to get a sense of what happens in the competition arena at a camera club! Full details will be shared via email but please put the date in your diary now.

Annual Dinner-Wednesday, 8 December

This year's annual dinner will be held on a **Wednesday**—the 8th of December to be precise, so make a note in your diaries now!

The annual dinner is a terrific night, full of fun, and an opportunity for us all to mingle socially and amongst other things, watch the presentation of trophies.

I was keen to show the positives of the learning some people are having rather than just show the awful side of this issue.

I had been asked to join a team from the Street Seen group at BCG as they had too many people for one team but needed a couple more to make up a second team. So I really had to get some images in. Whether any of my images were even chosen only time will tell, but it turned out to be a most interesting exercise.

The Aeroplane display has been cancelled from October and rearranged into next year.

So, our next Outing will be the final one for the year. It is the wonderful Hunt'n'Shoot (aka "What a Hoot!). This is one that everyone should seriously look at attending. It is fun and you can bring your friends and relatives along for the ride. And they can enter too. (It has been won by an eleven year old.)

A week beforehand you will be told where it is to be held. You will arrive at the place with a blank memory card. You will then be given the list of topics for the shoot, told the area in which the images are to be taken, and the time to return. You take only one attempt at each shot - no deletions!! It can be very funny.

You may also arrive a bit early and/or stay a bit later to take shots in the area to use for your Photoshoot Outings images.

September judging of *After Dark and Open* was conducted by the irrepressible Tryg Helander. Tryg is an associate in the Australian Photographic Society (AAPS), an accredited photography judge (PSQA) in the Photography Society of Queensland and also the current President of one of Queensland's oldest Photographic Societies, the TPS, in Toowoomba. Tryg is a great friend of QCG and has helped our club over the years by sharing his experience with camera club issues including understanding the merits of MyPhotoClub. Tryg is also one of the most articulate of PSQ judges, and his enthusiastic judging is always matched with the most interesting vocabulary including words like splendour, modernity, abomination, gravitas, muddy and laud!

Tryg started his judging by commiserating with us for his toughness, acknowledging how difficult it is to shoot after dark! Extensive written notes were provided for each and every QCG image, but some of his more general comments included:

- remember to keep titles to 35 characters;
- capturing the decisive moment was well-rewarded in both the set and open subject;
- contre-jour or having the sun or light source behind the subject – was noted as one of the techniques used in the set subject and Tryg invited us all to learn more about the technique;
- make sure makers soft-proof their images before printing;
- clean your sensor (or pay someone to do it) but in the meantime, make sure these spots are removed from your images before entering into competitions.

We sought some quick feedback from a couple of members after Tryg's judging. Geoff Shortland said he found Tryg's judging fascinating because Tryg was able to point out specific technical flaws in images while Yvonne Hill thought the quality of the images had been striking and Tryg's comments pretty much spot on with wonderful suggestions for improvement.

SPEAKER REVIEW: IAN PREECE ON BIRDS AND MACRO





Our September guest speaker was referred to us by QCG member Louise McDonald (see extra story below). Ian Preece is a professional photographer from New Zealand. He is principally a nature photographer and his portfolio of bird, macro and seascape photography is magnificent.

Passionate about New Zealand and all it has to offer photographically, Ian runs Seascape Photographic Adventures, offering workshop classes and holidays based around photography, often with one on one attention.

"On the question of why photograph, I am into creating an emotional connection with my subject," Ian told us.

"I see photography as an artistic endeavor because you are visualising, composing and seeing something of the world around you. I feel the technical aspects and the camera itself are the last piece of the puzzle. At the end of the day, the success of an image is the visualisation, the creativity. This is how I think about the images I take – connect, visualise, compose and capture!"

Ian enjoys photographing the landscapes and birds in a range of NZ ecosanctuaries near and around where he lives including Little Barrier Island, Great Barrier Island (which has Glenfern Ecosanctuary), Coromandel Town, Mahakirau which is a real treasure trove of endemic life. Rotoroa Island (an island sanctuary) and Tiritiri Matangi Island which Ian describes as the jewel in the crown.

During lan's presentation he referenced Louise McDonald and her talents as a photographer. He particularly noted this beautiful image, so of course, we asked Louise for a copy of the image and some backstory to go with. Read on!

This is a photo of gorgeous NZ Fantail on Tiritiri Matangi Island, a bird sanctuary just off the coast of Auckland and highly recommended by Ian Preece.

I had just purchased my first 'bird' zoom lens, a Tamron 70-600, so this little Fantail putting on a display was a real treat.

I then headed to The Coromandel to start a 5 day photography workshop with Ian's Seascape Photographic Adventures. I was the only student so got to make the most of Ian's expertise for sunrises, sunsets, night skies, waterfalls, and macro.

I fell in love with this pristine and beautiful part of NZ with its deserted beaches, great pizza, and stunning photo opportunities around every corner.

I'm going back as soon as I can and will definitely include another trip to Tiri.

Louise is hosting an exhibition of her work at Wynnum Gallery Space from 28 October to 8 November.
