At this venue we get to keep <u>Thursday night</u> meetings although the order will change with the 1st week of the month being Focus, 2nd Speaker and 4th Judging.

These meetings will start at 7.30 pm.

Photoshoots and Portrait Group will continue on weekend days.

And there is morethe exhibition planning for 'Collections 2021', led by Phil Lawrence is well underway. The Aspire Gallery is booked and you will hear more about this in coming weeks.

So you can see there are many activities to get you and your camera out and about this year.

There are also other initiatives in store that you will hear about over the next few months.

Adaptable Program

We have changed the QCG Program a little so we can adapt if necessary to the uncertainty of COVID. It will mean more focus on and regular checking of the Calendar as there will be more frequent updates. We have Elizabeth Riley to thank who, in a labour of love, both wrote and championed a team to produce both the updated **Handbook and Calendar**.

So, the important thing for you to do this year is to:

- face-to-face and live stream or Zoom.


Please be reassured that all events will operate under a COVIDSafe plan.

In future, you may be asked to register for events - Face to Face (and Zoom too if desired).

We have been trialling a registration booking system called 'Flocktu'. It is easy to use and seems to work well.

The benefit of this is that we can record face to face registration and attendances which is required for COVID compliance - without touching pen or paper. It also offers a payment system to avoid handling cash.

COVID has had an impact on our finances too. Without face to face, we have foregone income from door entry fees for Supper and Raffles.

We want to balance the QCG budget and address the shortfalls to also cover Zoom and streaming expenses.

We have put on our thinking hats on ways to do this.

Let us know if you have a creative suggestion on how we might do

this.

Thank you also in advance. We appreciate your patience as we try these new approaches and systems. They are tools to help us adapt

another exciting series of photographic events.

COMPETITIONS UPDATE

Welcome back to a new year of club competitions. It's scary how fast this has come around! Images for the first monthly aggregate competition of the year are due on or before our first Speaker Night on Thursday 11th February. The topics are Scapes and Open, and you can enter up to one print and one Digital Projected Image (DPI) for each.

Definitions for competition topics are given in the Handbook and in MyPhotoClub (MPC), where you upload your competition entries.

While the preferred way to drop off prints is by handing them in on Speaker Night, if you can't make it you may drop off prints to Anne Pappalardo or me (or any other club member who will hand them in for you) before Speaker Night. (Don't forget that a DPI version of all prints must also be entered in MPC – this is our record of entry.)

Even though it is a long way off, please start to familiarise yourself with the Year End Photographic Awards (information in the Handbook). These competitions celebrate the best images of the year across a number of categories. For 2021 they have been revamped to incorporate two sets of end-of-year competitions (the Annuals, last held in 2019, and the Best of the Best).

COLLECTIONS 2021

It's time to start thinking about this exciting Club Competition open to all members! The Love of the Photographic Print is what it is all about!

Taking part also gives QCG Photographers a great opportunity to experience an Exhibition of their work in a professional Gallery for a fraction of the cost.

In a nutshell "Collections 2021" is as follows:


- Jan . Selection of "Street Photography" as the normal monthly Aggregate competition for June 21.
- **March** Zoom Presentation on "Street Photography" by Melbourne Photographer, Adrian Whear.
- **End March** Photoshoot outing "Street Photography".
- **April** Focus Group Meeting on "Street Photography" by Adam Robert Young, Brisbane based Street photographer.
- **10 June** Up to 4 DPI (no prints at this stage) are submitted for the June 21 Aggregate competition. There will be no Open category in June.
- **24 June** PSQ Judge selects Honours and Merits as normal. The judge <u>also</u> selects the top 40 ungraded images for Exhibition.
- 6 July Selected images are printed by their owners and submitted for exhibition. To offset Gallery costs, makers pay \$20 per their first print and then \$10 for each subsequent print (if more than one is selected).
- **8 July** "Street Photography" specialist, Adam Robert Young, will then join our PSQ judge to select the top 3 images. The winner will receive the prestigious Roger Bartlett Print Project Trophy. Others will also receive a prize.
- **9/10 and 16/17 July** The 40 printed images will be displayed in the Aspire gallery, Paddington.

Each month in Prism I will provide additional details to keep you up to date on developments and what you should be doing to be part of "Collections 2021".
