Return of Dame Edna and Slim Dusty to QCG

At the recent judging of Water and Open, PSQ President Ralph Brown took the opportunity to present QCG with a couple of SEQ trophies, medallions and certificates as well as present this framed photo back to the club.

The print - an image of Dame Edna Everage (Barry Humphries) and Slim Dusty—was a favourite of a significant member of QCG, the late Stewart Parker. It was taken by photographer John Elliott at a concert at Carlton Hill station in the Kimberley in 1992 and has an interesting background worth noting given the photographer's relationship to the subjects.

John was involved in the music industry and in radio and television, hosting Ranch Club a Saturday night radio program at 4LG in Longreach.

He was also self-employed as a writer, photographer and documentary maker mostly with Australian culture and bush music and he compiled Australia's most extensive country music photo library. This is a limited print edition with only 11 prints signed by John Elliot (according to the records attached to the print). The story is that he sold



the image to the National Portrait Gallery and a billboard size of it welcomed visitors to the opening of the National Portrait Gallery in 1999.

Queensland Interclub Competition Judging This Month

This month, the Toowoomba Photographic Society will take a turn to host the *Queensland Interclub Competition*. This is an annual event open to all Queensland photo clubs affiliated with the Photographic Society of Queensland and your club, QCG, participates enthusiastically every year. Last month, a QCG selection committee put together the club entry which includes images selected across the Queensland Interclub Competition's set subjects of People or Portrait (this year it is People), Nature, Scapes, Black and White, Abstract, Still Life and an open category where only non-A graders' images are judged.

If you noticed that the set subjects in this interclub competition are a little familiar, well done! When the competition's subjects are settled at the conclusion of the judging with input from delegates from each club, QCG then uses these as the basis for its set subjects for the subsequent year. This makes putting together our entry for the Interclub competition a lot easier.

Elizabeth and Martin Riley will attend the judging as QCG's representatives this year. Due to Covid, numbers in attendance will be strictly limited, but Elizabeth and Martin promise to provide a report to us all when the judging is complete.

Judging as always will be impact by a panel and all images submitted by QCG are DPI in format. Good luck to QCG and thanks to Martin and Elizabeth for flying the flag.

September Photowalk with the APS

On 25 September, the Australian Photographic Society will host a photowalk with the theme Environmental Impact. While QCG will not participate as a club, any individual can participate (even if you are not a member of the APS) and the link to register is here.

This is how the APS describes its event:

Whether you walk city streets or wander bush trails, you can Indulge your imaginative self with club members and individuals from all around Australia. What an amazing opportunity to connect through photography and to interpret the good and the bad of Environmental Impact. Images must be captured on the day and metadata must be included when the images are uploaded for judgement. Individuals do not need to be APS members.

One of the benefits for those who register will be the introductory Zoom session the night before, hosted by Lisa Kurtz. Lisa is a talented street photographer and excellent photography mentor—she will be providing tips at this session for capturing great images.

QCG is also aligning a photoshoot outing with this event, but registration to the APS event is optional, that is, you may use this theme and the event parameters for your QCG photoshoot outing without having to participate in the wider APS competition.

Creative Night Photography presented by Greg Sullavan

Our August speaker, Greg Sullavan, entertained us on the topic of Creative Night Photography. His zoom presentation was very timely considering that the club has both 'After Dark' and 'In Camera Creative' set subjects coming up in September and October.

Greg, a professional photographer with more than 25 years industry experience, was also a longstanding ambassador for Canon Australia and led many a successful workshop for the Canon Collective (not a few QCG members have benefitted from these). His COVID project has been setting up Sunburst Studio with his wife Marija, specialising in photographic services and workshops. He is also an administrator of The Photographers Collective, a Facebook group.

Greg took us through his early experiences running 5 photowalks per night for the two weeks of the Vivid Festival in Sydney for many years. Capturing accurate pictures soon became boring, so he started experimenting, with longer exposures, multiple exposures, lens twists, new ways of framing, multiple exposures combining sharp focus with blur – all in camera. His mantra was the same one that Ross Miles and Julie Geldard used in the club's most recent photoshoot outing: What would happen if....

The obligatory gear discussion revealed that Greg has pared down his night photography gear as much as possible. He takes a single camera and lens, neckstrap removed, a head torch, a handheld lamp for light painting, and an antifog belt for the camera in cold weather. Greg carries a good tripod with an L bracket to allow quick changes between portrait and landscape orientations. But he did point out that if necessary, 'the world is your tripod', and there will always be a seat or a railing to stabilise your camera on, if you are caught out. He uses Haida magnetic filters and finds a remote cable release especially useful for

very long exposures using Bulb mode.

Greg discussed the basics of focus for night photography. Autofocus is often fine as there are plenty of contrast points in the city at night, but he also took us through several ways of focusing manually, including infinity focus, focus peaking and focus quides.

He also touched on colour temperature, finding that auto white balance will be unsatisfactory especially if you are moving the camera. He prefers to get white balance right in camera by adjusting the Kelvin setting until it looks right on the back of the screen rather than having to deal with inconsistencies in post. Finally Greg took us through examples of many different creative techniques, including starbursts, light trails, black and white street photography, 'mad street photography', lens twists, multiple exposures, fireworks, light painting, in camera HDR, bokeh effects, night portraits and panoramas (the one technique that does usually require stitching in post).

He also recommended setting yourself a Twelve Exposure challenge – give yourself one hour to take twelve images, which forces you to think about what you want to achieve before pressing the shutter. (As an aside, members interested in this should definitely participate in QCG's Hunt and Shoot later in the year, which is even more challenging – you are given 8 topics and must return with 8 images IN THAT ORDER, with no deletions!)

What I took away from Greg's most entertaining talk, apart from a consolidation of many techniques that had been covered by Ross and Julie, and a few new ones, was firstly the message to get out there, be playful, try new things, and experiment with the 'what if'. But to get a really memorable image, after your creative explorations, it is then important to think about what you are trying to achieve, and to consider your composition.

Greg's talk stimulated considerable virtual café discussion afterwards, with members grappling with the issues of how you can use these techniques to make a 'good' image rather than just a pretty picture, how to tell a story using these techniques, and how to create an image that remains memorable after the novelty of the effects has worn off.



The Audio Visual Genre in Photography

with Glenn Rossiter LAPS PSQA

Glenn, who is a life member at Peninsula Camera Club, has made audio visuals – the art of putting images in a sequence with sound – a lifelong passion and generously shared with the face-to-face workshop his tips and tricks.

PTE (short for Pictures to Exe) AV Studio 10 Pro is the software Glenn uses and prefers to create his AVs, although there are a range of other products including iMovie which will also do the trick. PTE AV Studio 10 Pro will only work on a 64 bit computer and costs around \$200. Elizabeth Riley advised the software was now also available for Mac.

Glenn in his own words is really into *travel* audio visuals and shared with the group quite a number which he and his wife enjoy watching regularly and it was wonderful to see how a fellow camera club member had taken his photography and photographs to a place where it could be enjoyed on a daily basis.

Glenn was also shared that while he was very much into documenting his own travels and urged us all to consider making these types of AV for our own personal pleasure, the world of competitive AVs did come with some 'rules' and 'guidelines' which were helpful to follow.

The key one is to be mindful of using images that you alone have produced and royalty-free music and sound effects.

AVs can be summarised as having three elements:

- Conception the idea
- Visuals what you look at, including graphics and words
- Sound including music, sound effects and voice overs.

"What's the best part of a movie?" Glenn enthused. "It's all about the sound and music!".

Glenn spent a fair part of his presentation going over the sound element of AVs including his opinion that voiceovers – where the author narrates their own audio visual – are not necessarily the answer to a great AV.

"First, you need to have a great voice," Glenn said.

"The other consideration is (as an audience member) you need to listen to a voice and concentrate on the speaking while also taking in the picture".

Accordingly Glenn was very comfortable and encouraging of the use of words or text throughout an AV over narration. He felt this delivered the message of the AV instantly.

Sound effects were singled out as the most important part of an AV and Glenn showed us a number of examples where the sound of cars, running water, storms were added to great, yet subtle effect. Sound effects can be sourced free over the internet and 'Ambient Mixer' was recommended as a great online sound effect generator. Elizabeth Riley also has links to royalty free music and sound effects listed under 'Resources' in MyPhotoClub.

On transitions (how one photo changes to the next in the series), Glenn said a simple fade is a good fade. Soft movement from left to right and keep it reasonably consistent.

Glenn talked us through the three areas that judges assess AVs:

Production including audience appeal, concept, narrative, presentation.

Sound including music, sound effects, narration, audio editing techniques

Images and Video including quality content sequencing transitions; quality is paramount.

On the length of AVs, Glenn said they can be up to 7 minutes long, but that at this length, they were often getting a little boring. Most of the examples Glenn showed us were under four minutes.

Elizabeth asked if we could change the ratio of the images during an AV. Glenn suggested if you needed to include a portrait image amongst a series of horizontals, to blur a background slide and put the vertical on top of that to avoid a stark black, or worse, white background.

Glenn sizes his images to 1920 x 1080 and uses the 16 x 9 HD format.

Before starting an AV he suggests you get everything you need into one folder including master images, edited images that have been resized and music and sound effects.

Glenn also suggested saving a zipped file of your master images with your completed AV so that in the future, if you wish to remaster your AV, all of your resources are safely in the one area, not likely strewn throughout your hard drive or other places.

At least the smaller number of entries made for an easier load on Richard Bassett, our experienced PSQ Judge for the evening. Richard provided many useful hints for tightening up images for competitions.

It was pleasing to be back face-to-face at SPACE for many of us, with the opportunity to view last month's prints, to catch up with fellow members and to chat with the judge. We are continuing with the hybrid model of delivery where feasible, streaming face-to-face meetings via Zoom, so that members can participate while choosing to remain at home.

This is only possible due to the efforts of Rob Champion, Geoff Shortland and David Bullock, with the help of Georgie Crossley when she isn't busy setting up print stands and prints. It takes a team to set up and test all of the projection and sound equipment and webcam and to run and troubleshoot the simultaneous Zoom delivery!

If you have any experience or interest in helping out with equipment setup or technical support, we are always looking for backup, so please make yourself known! (And a big shout out to Jenny Riesz and Dave McGinnis for establishing the setup in the first place.)

A bonus for the night was the visit by PSQ President Ralph Brown who presented the two trophies won by the club in this year's Salon of Excellence Queensland (SEQ). Individual members who placed in the individual competitions also received their certificates and medals. SEQ is an interclub competition where the onus is on individual club members to submit their own entries directly. It says a great deal about the enthusiasm and depth within the club that for the fourth year in a row, QCG has won not only the trophy for the highest number of points scored but also for the highest number of acceptances.

What's coming up? As well as preparing for next month's After Dark and Open aggregate competition, please start thinking about your entries for our Portfolio Night competitions (entries due Sept 23). These competitions, Three Related Images and the Audio Visual competition, are a chance to try something a little different. They don't count towards the aggregate pointscore trophies, but are stand-alone competitions in their own right. Check out the handbook and for more detail go to the grey 'Competition resources' button in MyPhotoClub. There is plenty of information there to get you started on both competitions. Instructions on how to submit your entries will be added soon.




