Focus

Photographic Honours, National and International Competitions and Understanding Impact Judging , with Tina Dial, Thursday 1 September

September kicked off with a bang with a presentation by Tina Dial, well known to many of us for her dynamic dog and stunning bird photography.

Tina is also a verifying officer with the Australian Photographic Society and has achieved the distinctions of EFIAP/g and GMAPS. As a result Tina understands the complexities of entering competitions to achieve Australian photographic honours and she took us all on her own journey to success so that we might get there sooner.

Amongst other things, Tina was keen to emphasise that we should not get too stressed if we enter myriad external competitions and don't do as well as expected.

"Don't let it get you down if you don't succeed in a particular competition and don't let honours get in the way of enjoying your photography," she said.

Some of the points Tina made included:

- Figure out your photographic strengths and enter competitions that have these as their set subjects;
- Watch your budget; the cost to enter can add up over time so keep an eye on your bottom line;
- Download the catalogue from your competitions and save somewhere safe on your computer as sometimes the catalogues disappear after very short periods of time.

Tina then put us into groups of three for a simulated impact judging exercise. We ran through 40 digital images in quick time, scoring each out of 10. We then compared and blended our scores with our team mates and decided on a champion image and other award winners. The exercise showed us why images with immediate 'wow' factor did well in impact judgings (the usual method for competitions which will contribute to towards honours), and also how opinions easily vary on what individuals and then groups see as superior entries. Tina's presentation appealed not only to those interested in achieving honours, but members seeking to understand how best to select images for any style of impact judging.

Speaker Review

From Law Maker to Image Maker with Alex Cearns, Thursday 8 September (Zoom)

Portraiture has always been a cornerstone of QCG's psyche, and the club has built a formidable reputation in the genre, both under lights, led by Gaye Edwards and Geoff Lawrence, as well as the environmental and outdoor styles showcased by many of QCG's own leading photographers.

But it seems pets are the new black when it comes to portraiture, and Alex Cearns was just the photographer to show us how it's done.

A smiling cat (right) and this sugar glider holding the hand of a human are just two of Alex's iconic images, the simplicity of which belies the planning that goes into each of her animal portraits.

As Creative Director of Perth based Houndstooth Studio, Alex has photographed more than 15,000 pets and is one of the most successful and experienced pet photographers in the industry.

Her clients include engaged pet lovers, leading corporate brands and Australian and international animal charities and conservation organisations.

Dogs Today Magazine UK called Alex Cearns "One of our greatest dog photographers in the world".

Deeply committed to the wellbeing of all creatures great and small, Alex is also considered one of Australia's most passionate champions and voices for animal rescue and wildlife conservation.

Her advocacy and philanthropy were distinguished with a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) from the Council for the Order of Australia for her service to the community through charitable organisations.

Our special September speaker was organised by QCG's very own passionate dog photographer Georgie Crossley and the vote of thanks was delivered by QCG's dog whisperer, Zoe McGrath.

A great night of animal photography delivered by an engaging and humorous speaker.

QCG Photo Book Competition

The winners of Queensland Camera Group's biennial photo book competition have been announced at a special afternoon event that was bittersweet for many of the QCG members that attended at the club's Kenmore clubhouse.


Thirteen books were judged across the two categories of Portfolio and Story Telling by experienced judges and photographers, Warren Veivers and John Doody.

The *Portfolio* category was won by QCG president, Martin Riley with a Momento Pro book entitled 'Textures from Above – The Kimberley' and the *Story Telling* Category was won by Phil Lawrence with his book 'Last to Leave'.

Jane McMenamin took out the *People's Choice* Award with her beautiful Momento Pro book, 'Early Bird'.







The winner announcements however were bittersweet with the sudden passing of Phil Lawrence the week prior.

Both winning books attract a \$150 voucher from competition sponsor Momento Pro, and QCG president Martin Riley thoughtfully has arranged for Phil's voucher to be used in the making of a photo book featuring Phil and some of his best-loved images.

"Phil played such an important role at our club over the past decade and a half. He conducted some key roles on our committee over many years, including the Presidency in 2016. At that time, he worked with Roger Bartlett to bring the print project, a gallery experience for members, to life.

"Considering Phil and Roger's love of working with collections it is appropriate that Roger take on this project," Martin said.

Martin's winning entry, which features abstract aerial images of the Broome coastline, the Derby tidal plains and the Cambridge Gulf, was described by judges as featuring brilliant photography with the most dazzling colours, very much like the work of Mieke Boynton.

"The Kimberley coast is one of the most remote and least populated part of Australia," Martin wrote in his book.

"The colours and textures are unique: the azure ocean, the red rocks of the coast, the perfect white sand, the colours and patterns of the river systems and the salt colours and textures created by the moving tides and rain events make a wonderful canvas.

"Bringing together the diverse scapes represented in this book has been my favourite photographic project to date."


Phil's book, 'Last to Leave' is a photographic tribute to the men of Detachment A Squadron, 3rd Cavalry Regiment (Det A Sqn 3 Cav Regt). They were among the last Australian combat troops to serve in the Vietnam War and withdrew from the country, aboard HMAS Sydney, in March 1972, now fifty years ago.

As Phil explains in his book, "It would be 15 years before the role of these troops fighting under the flag of Australia would be formally welcomed home by an Australian Government.

"[Of the 62 men in this detachment] the remaining 39 have been photographed combining a photo taken in 1972/72 with a recent Portraits in a 'Now and then' theme.

"50 years have passed, as the photos show, but the memories and mateship remain strong."

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Competitions Update

Another 'Five Thursday' month gave us a DPI judging via Zoom with PSQ judge Allan Rosser from Toowoomba, and a separate print judging at SPACE with PSQ judge Michael Stefanini (following our AGM). Both judges offered many useful suggestions for improving our images, while being quite entertaining.

A key message this month was how difficult it is, with a digital image, to provide a consistent experience for viewers. The screen on which the image is viewed, how recently or how well the screen has been calibrated, and the brightness of the screen and the room will all influence how an image is seen by the viewer. A printed image gives the maker more control, although even then what the viewer sees will be influenced by the lighting around the print.

QLD Interclub Competition (DPI)

September saw the annual judging of the Queensland Interclub DPI Competition. This is a long standing event on the Queensland calendar for camera clubs across the state. The event involves the impact judging of images across seven different categories with each club allowed up to three images in each subject.

The subjects in 2022 were as follows:

- Scapes
 Climate Change
- Nature

Silhouette

Non A Grade

- People
- Negative Space

Some of these topics will be familiar to our members, as they form the core of the set subjects for our monthly aggregate competitions. Scapes, Non A, People or Portrait, and Nature or Animal are on the calendar every year, with the other three being rotating subjects. The 2023 subjects which were voted on by all the club delegates will again form the basis of a number of our topics for next year.

This year Brisbane Camera Group hosted the event at their clubhouse in Albion. They did a wonderful job of welcoming visitors from outside their club and provided a good spread of cakes and sandwiches to keep the hunger pangs away! The MC for the day was former BCG President and current QCG member Ray Shorter (see below), who did a great job at keeping the competition rolling and the audience entertained. QCG members Martin and Elizabeth Riley and Hamid Rahnama attended the judging which was open to all.



The judging was undertaken by a three person panel impact style. I think this may have been the first time Hamid had witnessed impact judging and he was blown away at how little time judges had to assess and score each image! It is really not much more than a couple of seconds so first impressions count! The judges were the experienced Ralph Brown (president of Photographic Society of Queensland), Pia Jessen (committee member of Australian Photography Society) and well known Brisbane photographer Lisa Kurtz.

In total 23 clubs were represented across the state, from North Qld Camera Club located in Townsville to Goondiwindi Camera Club out west to Photo Arts Tweed located just across the border. Congratulations to host club Brisbane Camera Group and Aspley Camera Club who placed equal first in the competition. QCG placed a very credible fourth. QCG placed equal first in the Scapes section, thanks to some great images from Chris Pigott, Cheryl Mares and Tony FitzGerald. QCG's top scoring image was Firebirds, an entry from Yvonne Hill in the Nature section - well done Yvonne.

For those interested in attending the judging next year, it is a little further to travel with North Queensland Camera club hosting the event!

QCG's Landscape entry comprised 'Metro gateaux' by Tony FitzGerald, 'Moonscape Chile' by Cheryl Mares and 'Rocky shores' by Chris Pigott. 'Firebirds' by Yvonne Hill was QCG's top scoring image, entered into the Nature category.


